

A NOTE FROM THE OHNA PRESIDENT

As I was walking to my first board meeting in January, I was wondering how the meeting would go and what lies ahead for the Ottawa Hills Neighborhood Association in 2023. I also had three goals in mind: the meetings should be fun, a place where neighbors openly share their thoughts, and continuing the OHNA culture that has been going strong for five decades.

The January meeting went well and the subsequent meetings have been well attended. In March, the Executive Committee successfully launched our first hybrid OHNA Board Meeting. This provides another option for neighbors to attend meetings and share their ideas with the rest of the Association.

We started the year off with a few struggles, which included searching for block captains, volunteers and committee chairpersons. With great delight, many of our neighbors stepped up and most of the positions have now been filled.

At the beginning of the year, I had the opportunity to meet with the GRPD's South Captain, Lt. Cathy Williams. She also attended our February board meeting and answered questions as well as provided the Board with valuable information on a variety of topics. With her guidance, we are presently working on eliminating the increase in speeding on the streets in Ottawa Hills. You may have seen GRPD observers at various times in the neighborhood. Another step to improving traffic safety is completing the Neighborhood Traffic Calming Petition for the streets affected most by the excessive speeding. We are in the initial phase of this project and will provide updates as we work through the process.

In 2023, the OHNA Board will be gathering and finalizing information for the Policies and Procedures Manual as well as the implementation of text alerts. Both initiatives will continue to be discussed during the monthly board meetings.

Thank you to the Executive Committee: Tom Geelhoed, Lisa Theule, Craig Geers, and newly elected Managing Officer Dave Walker. I've relied heavily on their extensive knowledge as I learn more about the history of the OHNA Board, the neighborhood, committees, and activities. They've made my transition effortless.

I would also like to thank the dedicated volunteers that continue to donate their time, talents, and efforts to serve as block captains and those that support our many OHNA projects such as the Easter Egg Hunt, Garden Tour, Food Trucks, Garage Sales, Annual Newsletter, Social Media Support, and Ice Cream Social.

I, and the rest of the Executive Committee, welcome any questions, concerns and/or thoughts you may have regarding the Ottawa Hills Neighborhood Association, our activities, and our committees.

OHNA FINANCES

Highlights of our financial activity in 2022:

REVENUE of \$6,555 in neighborhood dues represented 66.9% of OHNA neighbors who paid their dues in 2022. The newsletter advertising brought in \$2,700, and the Tree Fund contributed an extra \$1,135. Total revenue received in 2022 was \$11,663.

EXPENSES in 2022 were \$1,702 for the newsletter, \$2,145 to fund our great events, \$2,950 for our annual light pole decorations, \$1,192 to update our website, and \$1,750 to refurbish four OHNA metal historical signs for a total expenditure amount of \$12,137. For 2023, we estimate total revenue of \$10,300. Our major expenses are budgeted at \$10,262, which will continue to support events like Food Trucks, Block Parties, the Garden Tour, Easter Egg Hunt and others. And we are planning again for the annual street pole decorating, allocating funds for our tree maintenance initiatives, and standard operating expenses to support the association.

Your continued dues and donations are important to help maintain the great OHNA neighborhood we all enjoy and are proud of! Thank you!






ABOUT OTTAWA HILLS

Ottawa Hills was plotted out as a residential area in the early 1900s on what was then the Grand Rapids Golf Club. The first houses were built in 1922 and homes continued to be constructed until the 1950s. The winding roads are said to follow the paths of the former fairways.

In the 1970s, the Neighborhood Association was established to preserve the neighborhood's unique features and prevent the decline that many other local neighborhoods were experiencing. Over the past 50 years, the Neighborhood Association has evolved and now sponsors many events, including an Annual Garden Tour, Ice Cream Social, neighborhood-wide Garage Sale and Neighborhood Clean-Up. Ottawa Hills is also the site of the Hollyhock Lane Parade, Michigan's longest running Independence Day parade, of which the Association is a sponsor. The strength of the Neighborhood Association comes from committed residents working together.




As I look out the window on this 80° mid-April evening, I see walkers, bikers, a boy bouncing a basketball on the sidewalk, a girl on a Big Wheel and dog walkers galore. In a few days, it is forecasted to snow!

The synergy of our unique architecture, our tree-lined streets, drives and boulevards create an urban walker's paradise. Our trees play a critical role in creating a sense of community for the neighborhood.

The first tree to flower this spring was a Cornelian Cherry at Giddings and Fisk. Quickly followed by an Allegheny Serviceberry in flower on Giddings. If you get a chance, check out the Alexander side of the school. The parkway will soon be in bloom with Allegheny Serviceberry trees, Eastern Redbuds and Japanese Tree Lilacs. These will in turn attract bees, butterflies and hummingbirds.

In 2022, we only needed to plant two trees. This spring, the City will be removing five old Norway Maple trees. We will replace those this fall or spring of 2024.



A few weeks ago, Becky Pobst and Gabby Pineda from Friends of GR Parks helped Bob Lee and me prune some of our young trees. Becky asked me to pass this along:

"The trees planted through the OHNA tree program are thriving, with an impressively low mortality rate. This is largely due to the care that went into selecting the right species for these sites, as well as a fantastic watering program that helped ensure the establishment of nearly every planted tree. With an average annual mortality rate hovering nationally around 20% within 2 years for newly planted trees, losing only one of hundreds planted is truly something to brag about! The trees planted and cared for in this neighborhood will be providing benefits to residents and neighbors for generations."

Becky knows what she is talking about. Friends of GR Parks will plant 2,000 trees in the City this year.


Have a young entrepreneur? Lemonade, water, and treat stands are always popular on the Tour.



Spring Clean

RECYCLING GUIDE

Spring cleaning doesn't mean a bunch of stuff has to go to the landfill.

Make sure <u>these items go in your recycling bin!</u>

1 Cartons & Cans

Spring cleaning can make you break a sweat! Whether you enjoyed some lemonade, pop, or a cold one, just empty-rinse-recycle-repeat!

4 Paper

If your spring cleaning involves an office decluttering, paper gets the recycling green light. Just remember no shredded paper due to its small size.

2 Corrugated Plastic Yard Signs

Just the sign only--remove the plastic stand (trash) or metal stand (scrap metal) and then you're good to go!

5 Plastic Buckets & Containers

Clean five-gallon buckets (with no handles) are the largest size of recyclable we can accept. Rigid plant pots or containers (no flimsy four or six paks or trays) are also good!

3 Aluminum Trays & Foil

Firing up your grill is a sure sign of spring! Clean aluminum trays and foil are perfect for your recycling bin.

If it's a NO for your recycling bin, don't worry! There are still options for your stuff to avoid going to the landfill.

Scrap Metal

Metal garden tools, rusted out grills, lawn mower blades, metal lawn art, & other oddsends metals are infinitely recyclable through scrap metal recycling drop-offs only.

We host two free scrap metal drop-offs at our North & South Kent facilities!

Chemicals & Cleaners

If the garage, shed, or under the kitchen sink are on your to-do list, old automotive fluids, fertilizers, pool chemicals, cleaners, & other hazardous waste can't just go in the trash.

Bring them to any of our SafeChem locations during designated hours to drop off items for free!

Bulky Plastics

Bigger plastic items such as tiny tyke playhouses, children's ride-on toys, plastic sheds, plastic greenhouse roofing are too large to recycle in your bin. Try a commercial recycler instead!

Reuse either through give-away, donation, or creative repurposing is also helpful in preventing waste from going to landfill.

Propane Tanks

Grill's hot! Grilling or camping one-pound propane canisters are free to dispose of through the SafeChem program.

Larger tanks will have a fee & need to go to either North or South Kent facilities!

Garden Hoses

Sometimes things just can't be recycled -- that's where reuse comes in! Make old hoses into an outdoor rug, homemade soaker hose, bungee for holding back thorny berry bushes, & more!

Same goes for rubber boots, landscape edging or fabric -- reuse is the way to go!

Flexible Plastics

Mulch bags, soil bags, birdseed bags, snow melt bags are all soft or flexible plastics that can't be processed through regular recycling due to the way they tangle around sorting machines.

Many retailers that recycle plastic grocery bags will also accept these when clean!

Paints & Stains

Aerosol & oil-based paints, as well as stains, should be disposed of at any SafeChem drop-off for free.

Once dry, latex paint can go in the trash.

Electronics

Do you have an old TV or computer that needs to make space in your basement? A drawer full of old phones & mystery chargers or cords? A broken blender or toaster?

Most electronics can be recycled for free through our North & South Kent facilities!

- c) Content intended to disparage or discriminate against Members or any citizen associated with the Association by virtue of any protected classification including race, gender, nationality, religion, age or handicap.

Violation of any of these policies may cause the offender to be removed, by the Executive Committee, from any future email correspondence and from the Association email list.

The email list, website and newsletter are solely the property of the Ottawa Hills Neighborhood Association, a not-for-profit corporation. The email list, website and newsletter exist solely for the purpose of conducting Ottawa Hills Neighborhood Association business. The Association owns all communication sent via email, information on the website and in the newsletter. Email addresses of Association members are private and to be used only for Association business. The email list shall not be forwarded to any individual(s) or organization(s) outside the Association without prior approval by the Executive Committee. Any unauthorized email use is prohibited, including but not limited to, advertising, informational search inquiries, endorsements, announcements and solicitations. If a subscriber wishes to be removed from the email list, they may unsubscribe at any time. Any feedback, questions, concerns, complaints or information relating to this Communication and Usage Policy may be directed to a member of the Executive Committee.

COMMUNICATION PROCEDURES

Substantive written material, visual or audial content developed on behalf of the Association for external audiences by any Executive Committee member, Block Captain or committee member must comply with the Communication and Usage Policy and shall be approved by at least two Executive officers of the Association, in addition to the author of said communication. In the event the reviewing officers cannot reach agreement, the material shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for a vote according to Article III, Section 8 of the bylaws dated November 15, 2022.

SOFTWARE ACCESS & USE PROCEDURE

Some job/volunteer responsibilities of the Association require access to the internet and the use of requisite software. The purchase of additional software needed to support Association activities must be authorized by the Board of Directors.






