

A NOTE FROM THE ACTING OHNA PRESIDENT

Spring has been slow to come this year. The TV meteorologists said this was the cloudiest beginning ever to April. And the temperatures have climbed for a day or two at a time before plunging back to snow friendly ranges. But the sun is growing stronger and we know that eventually warm weather will be here to stay.

2021 was like that. The introduction of vaccines gave us hope that things would get back to a post-COVID normal. But the Delta and Omicron variants slowed that process. Schools and businesses opened up unevenly. And while some of our activities in the neighborhood returned, not everything did.

Neighborhood Clean Up Day, the Hollyhock Parade and the food trucks were the type of outdoor activities that allowed us to gather together again. Though even the food trucks fell victim to overbooking and labor shortages. Monthly board meetings and the annual meeting continued to occur via Zoom. And TGIF returned sporadically, but with reduced attendance. We still hope that the neighborhood will return to normal, but the pace has been slow.

So as we look forward to the coming year, what are our best expectations? The first houses in the neighborhood were built in 1922. That makes this our Centennial year. Over the winter plans have been developing to recognize and celebrate this landmark in various ways.

Over the last two years over 100 trees have been planted in the neighborhood. This has been done not only to spruce up the neighborhood for us, but for future generations of neighbors. There is talk of planting special Centennial Trees at the school.

The Hollyhock Parade will continue its string of consecutives commemorations of the nation's birth. An idea has been floated for a special OHNA entry in the parade.

The OHNA Garden Tour is an annual summer highlight.
The last Saturday in June may see gardens decked out in
Centennial finery.

This summer may see the wholesale return of block parties. Will your block gather to celebrate the Centennial in a neighborly way?

Only two things hold back the variety of ways we can celebrate the Centennial. One is the extent of our imagination. What fitting way can you think of to celebrate this milestone? The other is the "people power" to implement those ideas. We are a volunteer organization and we need your effort to carry out these ideas.

I've served on the OHNA board for several years; first as a block captain and now as Vice President. After attending a meeting (and especially lately after chairing a meeting) I will often say to my wife, "our neighbors are such good people." The officers, block captains, and volunteers who give of their time care about their neighbors and their

neighborhood and demonstrate that every time we get together.

That gives me confidence that we will pull together to properly celebrate our Centennial. We just need to volunteer. I lived in the neighborhood for over 20 years before I first volunteered to serve on the Board. I felt like I owed it to the neighborhood to help keep it the kind of place that attracted us here in the first place. If you have a similar feeling, then this is the year to step forward to help.

The Board recognizes that we all have multiple demands on our time; family, work, school, church, charities, hobbies, politics, entertainment, etc. But the neighborhood calls, too. ABOUT OTTAWA HILLS

Ottawa Hills was plotted out as a residential area in the early 1900s on what was then the Grand Rapids Golf Club. The first houses were built in 1922 and homes continued to be constructed until the 1950s. The winding roads are said to follow the paths of the former fairways.

In the 1970s, the Neighborhood Association was established to preserve the neighborhood's unique features and prevent the decline that many other local neighborhoods were experiencing. Over the past 50 years, the Neighborhood Association has evolved and now sponsors many events, including an annual garden tour, ice cream social, neighborhood-wide garage sale and neighborhood clean-up. Ottawa Hills is also the site of the Hollyhock Lane Parade, Michigan's longest running Independence Day parade, of which the Association is a sponsor. The strength of the Neighborhood Association comes from committed residents working together.

OHNA FINANCES

Highlights of our financial activity in 2021 includes revenue of \$4,558 in neighborhood dues, this represented 67.6% of OHNA neighbors who paid dues in 2021. The newsletter brought in \$2,775 in revenue and we had generous tree fund donations of \$10,095. In all, we had a total revenue of \$18,475.

Our largest expense was the tree project, spending \$19,793. We continued the tradition of decorating the streetlight poles for \$2,340. The annual newsletter design and printing was a cost of \$1,617. The remaining expenses of \$4,739 covered events like the Garden Tour, Easter Egg Hunt, Ice Cream Social, Hollyhock Lane Parade, and dog waste containers at Pontiac Field, and operating expenses such as, Zoom subscription, officers' liability insurance and our PO Box. All reflecting total expenses of \$28,489.

For 2022, absent the tree initiative, we anticipate about \$9,500 in revenue. Our major expenses will be supporting our Centennial, refurbishing the four neighborhood signs. rebuilding of the OHNA website, decorating the light poles, planting a few new trees, supporting the food trucks and so on.

Your continued dues and donations help maintain the great neighborhood we all cherish!



CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

In 2022, the Ottawa Hills Neighborhood will celebrate its centennial anniversary, acknowledging our theme of community support that over 100 years has never stopped. We are excited to mark this milestone anniversary that pays tribute to our history, celebrates today, and will influence tomorrow. Our Centennial celebrations will extend throughout the year giving us a chance to celebrate all year long.

Our neighborhood is one with a storied history that began in the early 1900s and includes a 160-acre pig farm and a 9-hole golf course. The golf course changed hands several times and eventually one of the owners decided to develop the land which would become our neighborhood. The land was mapped out and featured beautiful winding drives and large open areas where streets intersect. The first lots were sold in 1922 and went so quickly that a second plat was put on the market in 1923.





In 1925, Ottawa Hills High School was built on 9 acres of the land and ended up anchoring the neighborhood for 85 years. By 1928, 200 brick homes of varying architectural style dotted the neighborhood, within walking distance of Franklin Park (now Martin Luther King Park), Calvin College and the Clark Home. There was little change during the Depression and World War II. In the 1960s property values decreased to the point that the Association coordinated efforts to stop redlining, blockbusting and soliciting listings with scare tactics.

Over the years the Association, which will also celebrate 50 years of existence in 2022 has sponsored a babysitting coop, a bridge group, a garden tour, and has been a long-time supporter of the beloved Hollyhock Lane Parade.

In 2009 the Grand Rapids Public School system sold the school building to Grand Rapids Christian schools to develop a pre-kindergarten through 4th grade school and this anchor, along with Pontiac Field once again stabilizes the neighborhood. It is clear our neighborhood has seen many changes through our history, but several things have remained constant, a deep appreciation for our community's history and a dedicated and tenacious group of neighbors.

We are honored and delighted to call Ottawa Hills our home. Many festivities will mark this anniversary and we will look to you for ideas on how to promote the fun. We are already brainstorming of ideas like outdoor fitness classes, walking and architectural tours, music in the park, food trucks, outdoor movies and a neighborhood picnic. Keep your eye on the monthly newsletter for ways you can contribute to making this a brilliant and memorable year.


Have a young entrepreneur? Lemonade, water and treat stands are always popular on the tour.



The OHNA is pleased to announce that all spots for parkway trees have been planted. We now have 712 trees in our neighborhood parkways. As our young trees mature, we should reach 80% tree canopy coverage of our sidewalks and eventually our streets. From 2007 to 2019, John Wittkowski and Kathy Vance worked diligently to raise the funds and grants while gathering volunteers to plant 130 trees. In the last 18 months we have planted an additional 130 trees. We have planted 34 new tree species, thus a mini arboretum!

Our neighborhood has 214 Norway Maples that have reached the end of their lifespan. They will all die off over the next 10 years or so. We will quickly replace them with new trees as they are removed. The City's policy is to remove a tree when it no longer shows signs of life. Several neighbors, with the city's approval, have paid to remove dying and/or unsightly Norway Maples in their parkway. The cost to remove a tree and stump ranges from \$800 to \$1,200. The OHNA will plant a new tree at no charge. This is an option for you.





It takes three years of a consistent watering program to establish and develop a city tree's root system. It is critical that they receive the correct amount of water at the right time. You have probably noticed the green watering bags on many trees around our neighborhood. Our professional watering service has done an excellent job nurturing them. The annual cost for this service is approximately \$5,000, covered by a neighbor's generous contribution.

We expect to be replacing about five trees a year. Total cost per tree is approximately \$200-\$300 depending on species. The watering program will continue for two more years. Please continue to give generously to the OHNA Tree Fund.

PS: PLEASE NOTE that our City Forester pointed out that in large enough quantities the urea nitrogen found in dog urine will kill a young tree. Please make sure that your dog doesn't pee any closer than five feet from our young trees. Thanks!

WHAT DO WE DO?

That was the question one of our young neighbors asked when he found out about the Afghan refugee crisis. After some investigation, we landed on an answer: Join with nine other Ottawa Hills families to support a newly arrived Afghan family of seven. In mid-November, in partnership with Bethany Christian Services, our team welcomed the exhausted family at the airport and helped them settle into temporary housing. Since then we have been walking alongside this family. We help with everything from getting phones and groceries to assisting with medical appointments, deep needs with ESL instruction, and countless immigration challenges. The family is a joy and always meets us with immense hospitality, regularly inviting our team members in for tea or a meal. Once settled into an apartment, they even hosted the entire team for an Afghan feast! While we didn't plan to build a team with specific roles, our members have a variety of professions and skills that have all worked together to help with different aspects of settling into life in Michigan. We are all quick to point out that no one family could have done this on their own—we all need our neighbors—and that the rewards are beyond what we ever imagined!

GET YOUR FREE SMOKE ALARMS FROM THE GR FIRE DEPARTMENT

Within the last nine years, the Grand Rapids Fire Department has installed approximately 67,000 smoke alarms in 11,500 homes — entirely free of charge. Many older homes in the city have less than three smoke alarms which aren't nearly enough, and a significant number of homes have no working smoke alarms at all.

With that in mind, the GRFD initiated the Residential Safety Program (RSP) in 2013 to help reduce home fires potentially saving property as well as lives. Using a FEMA-based (Federal Emergency Management Agency) grant, the RSP not only provides free smoke alarms to Grand Rapids homeowners, but their trained crews also install the devices. During installation of the devices personnel preview the home to ensure there are no potential safety hazards which may cause a home fire. If any exist, the homeowner is notified and if possible, the firefighters help to resolve the matter. In addition, the program also offers up to three free carbon monoxide (CO) detectors along with smoke alarms. One for each level of the home. Carbon monoxide is a tasteless, odorless, invisible gas sickening 20,000-30,000 per year and killing 500+ people annually.

And as warmer climates are fast approaching, the desire to take in the best activities of summer are always heightened. So here are a few helpful hints to keep you and your family safe during this period:

- Never leave your grill unattended.
 Unattended cooking is the leading cause of fires throughout the year.
- Before grilling, ensure the fire pit is at least three feet away from the house.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill when it's hot.
- Use a metal meshed screen over woodburning recreational pits to keep sparks from floating out.
- If you want to see fireworks, go to a public show put on by experts. Sparklers can reach 1,200 degrees F and cause third-degree burns.

COMMUNICATION PROCEDURES

Substantive written material, visual or audial content developed on behalf of the Association for external audiences by any Executive Committee member, Block Captain or committee member must comply with the Communication and Usage Policy and shall be approved by at least two Executive officers of the Association, in addition to the author of said communication. In the event the reviewing officers cannot reach agreement the material shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for a vote according to Article III, Section 8 of the bylaws dated October 16, 2007.



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
