



About Ottawa Hills

Ottawa Hills was plotted out as a residential area in the early 1900s on what was then the Grand Rapids Golf Club. The first houses were built in 1922 and homes continued to be constructed until the 1950s. The winding roads are said to follow the paths of the former fairways.

In the 1970s the neighborhood association was established to preserve the neiahborhood's unique features and prevent the decline that many other local neighborhoods were experiencing. Over the past 45 years, the neighborhood association has evolved and now sponsors many events, including an annual garden tour, ice cream social, new neighbor party, neighborhoodwide garage sale, and neighborhood clean-up. Ottawa Hills is also the site of the Hollyhock Lane Parade, Michigan's longest running Independence Day parade, of which the association is a sponsor. The strength of the neighborhood association comes from a group of committed residents working together.

Dan Haveman OHNA President Street Lighting Project Enters Next Phase

Over the past two years our neighborhood has been working with the City of Grand Rapids on a proposed replacement of our beautiful- but aged- ornamental street lights. Installed over 40 years ago, the poles and fixtures that help make our area so special are damaged and failing, and like replacements are no longer available. The wiring is also failing and must be replaced to prevent the outages that have become all too common of late.

To show us what the new fixtures would look like, the City has installed a "sample" pole at Cadillac and Seminole which is 16 ft. tall. Our poles would be 12 ft. tall to blend with our streetscape and would be installed with all new underground wiring throughout the neighborhood.

Costs of the total project have been determined by the City to be \$370,000 which includes the original installation and a reserve for future repair and replacement which is the new City policy. When assessed on a front footage basis it comes to \$22.30 per foot, payable in annual installments over 10 years at 7% interest on the unpaid balance. Corner lots are assessed on the basis of the footage on the shortest side of the lot, plus the footage on the longest side, minus 150 ft. The City would contribute 23.5% of the project costs and the school would be assessed 11.5% of the total. The remaining 65% would be shared by the residents at the per-foot rate described.


The City has agreed to have the poles wired with a 110 volt plug at the bottom of the pole so that we could string lights on the poles during the holiday season to add a festive atmosphere to the neighborhood. Those of us who would like to salvage one of the removed poles to place in our yard or garden could attend the City's annual auction of surplus goods and acquire one there.

Petitions have been prepared by the City and WILL BE CIRCULATED BY YOUR BLOCK CAPTAINS IN THE NEXT FEW WEEKS! If you support the project please sign the petition so that we may turn them in to the City. If owners of more than 50% of the property to be assessed sign the petitions, the City will hold a public hearing which will give everyone—those for or against the project—a chance to be heard. The City will then decide whether the project will go forward.

We pride ourselves on the special nature of our winding streets, wonderful trees, beautiful homes and gardens and our ornamental street lights. This project is our opportunity to pass this unique place we call Ottawa Hills on to the next generation.


OHNA has a New Website and Facebook Page

We ask that you stop by the office to sign up to see which boxes are available. We will need your name and contact information before you choose from available boxes.

Once you have a planting box at East Church, you can come & go as you please to cultivate and harvest your crops. Our garden hose will be on and you may water your box as it is needed. There is no charge, however any donations to help with water costs won't be turned away!

And, if you find you have harvested plenty and would like to share, our food pantry families always welcome fresh garden food. We are home to a Baxter Community Services food pantry called "Feeding God's Children" which is open the first two Tuesdays of every month from 1pm-4:30pm. You may drop off food donations in the office during business hours, Monday through Thursday 9am-3pm.

Please sign up in the church office or contact us at 616-245-0578 to reserve your box. East Congregational UCC members have first priority until Tuesday, May 5, 2015. After this date, boxes will be available to friends and neighbors of our community. Unfortunately, due to our limited staff, we cannot provide security for your garden box. OHNA Trees

Last year we continued our tree planting in the neighborhood with a grant from Friends of Grand Rapids Parks and were able to plant 17 trees around the neighborhood. Thank you to the volunteers who helped make this possible and to those who kept the trees watered. Hopefully we will see green leaves on them this year.

The next step to more trees is to get the many stumps in the neighborhood ground out so we have spaces to plant. Kathy Vance has been in touch with Joe Sulak, the new Forester for the City of Grand Rapids. She shared with him a list of 14 stumps that have not been ground out over a number of years. His last response (March 24, 2015) was

"Currently we have a Stump contract out for bid with the plan for the contract to start by mid to late April. The stumps in Ottawa Hills are part of that contract and will be ground by summer of this year. You should see some utility locates prior to the grinding. The contract specifies removal of all grindings, replace with soil and apply grass seed."

He indicated he would notify her of the work schedule and she will share it with OHNA. If all goes well, and the Friends of the Grand Rapids Parks continues their grant program, hopefully we can have another tree planting this fall.

Since 2007,80 trees have been planted in Ottawa Hills. The first 65 were paid for by neighbor donations. The last 15 through a grant. We continue to lose trees as they age, so we would like to keep the planting momentum going.

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Electronic Communication & Usage Policy

Ottawa Hills Neighborhood Association

The Neighborhood Email List and Neighborhood Web Site are solely for the purpose of conducting Ottawa Hills Neighborhood (referred also as the "Neighborhood") business. Some job/volunteer responsibilities of the Neighborhood require access to the Internet and the use of requisite software. Only people appropriately authorized may use the Email List and/or Web Site, or access additional software on behalf of the Neighborhood. The Neighborhood Email List, Web Site and Newsletter are solely the property of the Ottawa Hills Neighborhood.

Software Access & Use Procedure

Software needed, in addition to the Microsoft Office suite of products, must be authorized by the Board. This includes any software used to publish the Neighborhood Newsletter. Any information for Neighborhood wide dissemination, including any printed media, pictures and images must be authorized by the Board. This includes original content or content taken from other sources.

Email Usage

Email of Neighborhood members are private and to be used only for Neighborhood business. No emails of Neighborhood members are to be used collectively or individually for any personal business or business not associated with Neighborhood sanctioned business or activities. Sanctioned Neighborhood business or activities shall never include:

- A. Activities of propaganda or attempts to influence legislation, intervention for, or in opposition to any public office candidate.
- B. Individual neighbor personal business including, advertising, informational search inquiries, endorsements, announcements, solicitations, etc.
- C. Sending pornographic images, jokes or stories or any other objectionable material via email is prohibited.
- D. Any emails that discriminate against Neighbors or any citizen associated with the Neighborhood by virtue of any protected classification including race, gender, nationality, religion, age or handicap shall be prohibited.

Emails of neighborhood members are private and not to be forwarded to any individual(s) or organization(s) outside the neighborhood without prior approval of the neighbor. The Neighborhood Email List is solely the property of the Neighborhood and shall not be distributed without permission from the Board. All emails shall be of a civil tone and respectful to all receivers.

Violation of any of these policies may cause the offender to be removed, by the Board, from any future email correspondence and may cause the violator to be removed from the Neighborhood Email List.

Neighborhood Ownership

The Neighborhood owns any communication sent via Email, any information on the Web Site and any information in the Newsletter. Any unauthorized use is prohibited. All mailing list email should be sent "one ad-dress per piece". If any subscriber to the Email List wishes to be removed, they may unsubscribe through the email system at any time. Any feedback, questions, concerns, complaints or information about this Communication Policy or about usage shall be directed to the Board President for review and consideration.
